The BIG Dance featured live performances throughout the evening by Jordan Kahn's Manhattan Orchestra, transporting guests back to the golden age of Motown with classic soul tunes and line dance lessons from the era that concluded with a party-wide Soul Train line! The event also honored the nine Presidential Scholars who had previously attended the Dallas Black Dance Academy (DBDA).

An honor reserved for the nations most distinguished graduating seniors, the **Commission on Presidential Scholars** only selects **20 U.S. Presidential Scholars in the Arts** each year. DBDT's nine Presidential Scholars embody the mission and spirit of the Academy, with **their first Presidential Scholar being recognized in 1980** within one of the first cohorts of Presidential Scholars of the Arts, which the program only extended to include in 1979.

The evening's emcee, **Three-Time Emmy Award-winning NBC 5 news anchor Kristi Nelson** was joined on stage by the founder of both Dallas Black Dance Theatre and Dallas Black Dance Academy, **Ann M. Williams**, to present the awards to the Presidential Scholars and their representatives.

The honored Presidential Scholars included Milton T. Tatum (1980 Presidential Scholar), Dereque Whiters (1981 Presidential Scholar), Ramona Jackson (1983 Presidential Scholar), Carla Wattley (1985 Presidential Scholar), David Wilson (1987 Presidential Scholar), Courtney Blackwell (1998 Presidential Scholar), Vernon Gooden (2001 Presidential Scholar), My'Kal Stromile (2014 Presidential Scholar) and Jared Brown (2016 Presidential Scholar).

The proceeds from The BIG Dance will directly support Dallas Black Dance Academy's mission of providing high quality dance education to students throughout the DFW Metroplex. Every year the funds raised allow for a 40% reduction in tuition fees for students enrolled in DBDA training programs, in addition to providing support to free in-school outreach programs for more than 3,000 K-12 students across the DFW Metroplex.

Since 2012, 100% of Academy seniors have graduated high school and been accepted to college, with many receiving scholarships to top dance programs like

Juilliard. Additionally, DBDA graduates have been awarded talent scholarships to outstanding universities and colleges, with many have been chosen to perform in professional ballet, modern dance, and jazz companies throughout the United States and Europe, while many others are furthering dance education and teaching across the United States.

ABOUT DALLAS BLACK DANCE THEATRE

Founded in 1976 by **Ann Williams**, and currently under the direction of Melissa M. Young, **Dallas Black Dance**Theatre's mission is to create and produce contemporary modern dance at the highest level of artistic excellence through performances and educational programs that bridge cultures and reach diverse communities. As the largest and oldest professional dance company in Dallas, DBDT is the fourth-largest Black dance company in the nation, the seventh-largest contemporary modern dance company, and ranked 36th among the nation's leading ballet companies. Located in the thriving downtown Dallas Arts District, DBDT has performed worldwide for over 4.6 million arts patrons and 2.8 million students in 33 states and 16 countries on five continents. The performances include two Olympics (1996 & 2012), the nation's most prestigious venues (Lincoln Center, Kennedy Center, Broadway, Jacob's Pillow), and for such luminaries as Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and South African President Nelson Mandela. Since the pandemic began in 2020, DBDT performances have also been viewed virtually in 43 countries. The Company has been recognized by the National Endowment for the Arts as an American Masterpiece Touring Artist (2008) and received the Texas Medal of the Arts Award for Arts Education (2017).

ABOUT DALLAS BLACK DANCE ACADEMY

The official school of Dallas Black Dance Theatre celebrates 50 years of delivering dance instruction to a community of diverse backgrounds. It was founded by **Ann Williams**. The academy trained the **first student in the nation to receive the Presidential Scholar Award** in Dance in 1980. Students participate weekly in 36 dance classes, including ballet, jazz, tap, modern, and African on-site at DBDT's studios. Classes are held at Dallas Black Dance Theatre's studios and are open to students ages four to adult. The academy has three performing ensembles: **Allegro Performing Ensemble, Dallas Black Dance Theatre's premier academy ensemble, Senior Performing Ensemble**, and **Junior Performing Ensemble**.
